Section 10 — In Your Own Words

Answer Prompts A, B, and C. Each prompt shows its own word requirement in parentheses. Prompts D, E, F, and G are optional, but we strongly encourage you to answer them; they give the committee a fuller picture of you and allow a better evaluation of your application.

*This isn't a writing competition; it's how we get to know you. Write in your own voice and include specific, factual details: real names, places, dates, and examples from your actual life, not general statements. Essays must be your own original work. Essays that are polished but vague or generic, or that appear to be AI-generated or plagiarized, will be treated as incomplete and will not be considered, regardless of how well they read. We do encourage you to have someone you trust proofread your essays for errors that could distract from your content: correct grammar, punctuation, spelling, and capitalization. **This is a safe place to tell your real story** (see the privacy note on page 1). Nothing you write here goes to your parents or your school.*

Applicants may answer one or both of the A prompts. If you answer both, each essay needs its own 300 words.

Prompt A-1 — Responsibility & Growth (minimum 300 words)

Many students take on real responsibility at home: a job, caring for a family member, translating for parents, or helping manage a household. Describe a time you took on this kind of responsibility: what did you do, what did it require of you, and what has it taught you about yourself? Use specific details, such as names, places, and dates, rather than general statements.

Prompt A-2 — Responsibility & Growth (minimum 300 words)

Some students step up and take charge somewhere outside the home, in a leadership role (team captain, band leader, club officer) or another situation where real responsibility was placed on them. Describe a time you did this: what did you do, what did it require of you, and what has it taught you about yourself? Use specific details, such as names, places, and dates, rather than general statements.

Prompt B — Working Toward a Goal (minimum 300 words)

Describe a goal you worked hard to reach, in school, at work, in your community, or at home, even when the resources or support around you were limited. What did that effort look like day to day, and what kept you going? Walk us through it concretely, not in general terms.

Prompt C — Looking Ahead (minimum 300 words)

Why does earning a college degree matter to you? Describe the future you are working toward, for yourself and for the people who matter to you, and the kind of career and stable life you hope a degree helps you build. Then show us the plan behind it: what research you have done, what a realistic timeline looks like, and the concrete steps you are taking (or plan to take) to get there.

Prompt D — Significant Challenge or Hardship (Optional but encouraged, no minimum)

Every applicant faces some kind of challenge or obstacle on the way to pursuing a college degree: financial hardship, a physical or health-related condition, a disability, abuse, family drama or disruption, academic difficulty, a personal challenge such as shyness, or fear of rejection or disapproval from others, or another kind of difficulty, whether you have experienced it in the past, overcome it, or continue to deal with it now. Describe a significant challenge or challenges you have faced and how you coped or continue to overcome.

Prompt E — Personal Triumph (Optional but encouraged, no minimum)

What do you personally consider your own triumph or success, no matter how big or small? This could be something like tutoring someone and watching their grade improve, helping care for a younger sibling, finally learning a dance routine, or making first chair in band. Tell us about the one that feels most personal and meaningful to you, and why.

Prompt F — Talent or Creative Pursuit (Optional but encouraged, no minimum)

Do you have an artistic or creative talent, traditional or nontraditional? This could be something like music, visual art, dance, or theater, or something less traditional like cooking, gaming, building or mechanical work, fashion, or digital design. Tell us about it and what it means to you. You can add a link to social media, links to YouTube videos if your preferred creative format is video, or attached digital media for formats such as photographs or other visual art.

Prompt G — Additional Context (Optional but encouraged, no minimum)

Is there anything else about your home, school, or community circumstances that you'd like the selection committee to understand as they review your application?

Section 11 — Letters of Recommendation

List two people who know you well and can speak to your character, work ethic, and potential; you may add an optional third. A teacher or counselor, coach, employer or supervisor, mentor, faith leader, or another community adult who has directly observed your work or responsibilities.

What we ask your recommenders to provide

Confirm with each recommender that they will supply the letter, and share with them that the Foundation looks for the following information to be included in it. We ask every recommender to address two things:

1. Short-answer ratings.

A brief set of questions rating the applicant on:

- 1. Academic ability and potential
- 2. Maturity and responsibility
- 3. Work ethic and ability to follow through under difficult circumstances (i.e., tenacity and grit)

Specific examples are appreciated and are much more helpful than general descriptions.

2. A narrative paragraph or two.

A description of the applicant's achievements; the obstacles, responsibilities, or circumstances (personal, family, financial, or academic) they have navigated; and their readiness for college-level work.

Recommenders will receive their own short form to complete (rating questions plus the narrative above) after you enter their information in the recommender intake form; this description is here so applicants understand what is being asked and can choose and brief the right recommenders.

Section 12 — Understanding & Commitment

This scholarship is not a one-time gift or an entitlement, and selection is not automatic or guaranteed. If you are selected, becoming a Scholar is the start of an ongoing partnership: you will be expected to maintain the required GPA, complete the Foundation's volunteer-hour and program requirements, and stay engaged with mentoring and Foundation events as described in the Scholar Handbook. Funding can be reduced, placed on probation, or ended if those requirements are not met. We are looking for applicants who bring real grit, compassion, and a desire to give back, along with hard work. Applicants need to go into this understanding that our scholarship comes with real, ongoing accountability.
